SAILING INTO SABBATICAL CUCC, March, 2019

A "sabbatical journey" is a shared journey by Pastor and Congregation. We have received a "Clergy Renewal Grant" for this journey, and information will be shared throughout the year so that we can all engage in sabbatical renewal and refreshment and learning together. See the Bulletin Board for the full description of the Sabbatical—both the pastor's and congregation's parts and focus.

The theme for the sabbatical is "Natural World as Word" from a particular theme of Celtic Christianity referred to as "Two Books." John Scotus Eriugena (9th c) expressed it: *God speaks to us through two books: the 'little book' of Scripture and the 'big book' of creation."* Our sabbatical will explore Celtic Christianity, already begun at CUCC, with a specific focus on this "Two Books" stream, which also has parallels in Native American spirituality. This will encompass study of nature, music, ancient stories, sites and experiences.

Christian Theological Seminary Announces 148 Congregations Awarded Lilly Endowment 2018 National Clergy Renewal Program Grants

Christian Theological Seminary and the Lilly Endowment National Clergy Renewal Program has awarded grants to **148 congregations located in 33 states** and DC. The grants provide congregations support to enable their pastors to take time away from ministerial responsibilities for reflection and renewal. Pastors use the respite to engage in renewal experiences that often include travel, scholarly research and immersive experiences with different cultures and traditions.

"Pastors play an important role in nourishing the spiritual lives of individuals and in guiding the work of the Christian congregations they serve. Through these grants we seek to honor pastors for their extraordinary service and enable them to engage In a brief period of rest and renewal. We have learned that such experiences invigorate the leadership of pastors and bring new vitality to their congregations as well."

Congregations in the 2018 program represent diverse Christian traditions. The congregations and their pastors worked together to determine how the pastors will use the grants to replenish, restore and renew their ministries. Travel to domestic and international destinations and journeys into nature are popular activities for grant recipients. One pastor will travel with family to Rome and Florence to explore iconography and the ways that art can inspire understandings of God. Another pastor will journey to different parts of the United States experiencing sacred stories, family stories, and the stories that connect her with others as she encounters storytellers from many settings.

In addition to travel as a form of renewal, some pastors will use their time away from their congregations to engage in new spiritual disciplines, focus on time with loved ones and study topics that renew their excitement for preaching and leadership. The Renewal Program leverages the reciprocal dynamics of support, trust and encouragement reflective of healthy congregations. The program is designed to respect the innate human need for times of service and replenishment. It provides a means for congregations to express appreciation for their leaders' service and respect for his or her health and energy for continued ministry. The grants recognize the tremendous amount of energy, time and leadership that pastors invest in their congregations.

Congregations were invited to apply for grants of up to \$50,000. The application process was participatory in nature, involving congregations and their pastors in the design and development of the renewal experience. Up to \$15,000 of the grant could be allocated to fund interim pastoral leadership, as well as renewal activities within the congregation. Pastors were encouraged to include their families in the renewal activities.

Then she said she liked to live in such a generous friendly facility. Of course, I tried to sign her up right on the spot, but I guess she was happy at her real apartment.

I know people who would have been very upset at such a mistake at their expense. I even wonder how I would have felt if I had been that sweet lady.

What I was reminded of by having this experience is that life is so short, very few things are worth having a fit over. Certainly, the elderly lady in the pink nightgown knew this and even seemed to enjoy the morning with us.







 - c. 4th of July pie sale



You don't have to be 65 or older to join, but check with your health insurance plan to see if you are eligible. The easiest way to do so is to go to the following webpage and plug in your name and birthdate. You'll be in the system if your plan has this benefit. You can either print out your paper card instantly or ask for a laminated card at a later time.

CUCC Council Minutes

February 20, 2019

<u>Present</u>: Kay Allinger, Ann Condra, Helen Duncan, Marge Erickson, Ron Erickson, Ron Hassell, Cindy Helm, Rebecca Kemper Poos, Betsy Neas, Janet Steiner, Kathy Roman, Ron Rak.

Marge Erickson called the meeting to order at 7:09pm, opening with a prayer of encouragement. A review of upcoming events on the church calendar was noted on the Meeting Agenda. Changes included the March 10 Outreach Team meeting changed to 11:45am, and the Faith Education Team meeting time is 4:00pm.

Continuing Business

Memorial Window Replacement Project. Janet opened the discussion with a request to rename the project something other than Memorial Windows. Suggested were 140th Anniversary Windows, Honoring Families, Family Celebration Windows, Celebration Windows. Ron Hassell noted that the maximum number of windows will be 15, starting in the Sanctuary, then the Office, then the Fellowship Hall. Work is expected to be done in phases depending on costs, budget and availability of windows. No stained glass windows. Local suppliers will be researched, and it was decided that the windows will be professionally installed. It's expected to all be done by next winter.

Pastor's Report. The first priority is working on filling out the March calendar. Lenten preparations are under way, to include creative ideas such as Celtic traditions in the worship and praising God's beauty and creation. Jim Hight is planning to conduct a dialogue on March 14 (location TBD) on the recent Red Flag law being considered by the state legislature, gun violence and related topics. Rebecca has offered to assist with the Sunday evening March 14 service at the Episcopalian church in Leadville, since the pastor is dealing with cancer-related health issues. Planning for Rebecca's sabbatical is ongoing; updates for the congregation will be posted on a bulletin board and in the monthly newsletter. A sabbatical planning team is being assembled to assist. The sabbatical is scheduled June 10 - September 15.

General Business and Reports

Minutes from the January 16 Council meeting were reviewed. Ron Erickson/Ann Condra moved to accept the minutes as written; motion passed. {NOTE: Minutes from the January 27 Congregational Meeting are in process, and should be approved at the next Council Meeting. Bylaws will need to be changed to clarify when minutes from the newly planned quarterly congregational meetings are approved.}

Clerk's Report: Ron Rak noted no reported changes in the congregation since the last meeting.

Treasurer's Report: Cindy Helm highlighted the January Financial Statement, noting from the end-of-report summary page that general contributions for January were under budget by \$3,572, and there were no concerns expressed by the Finance Team this early in the year. A major change in procedure will be initiated next month to reduce paperwork and get the financial reports to each team more quickly by emailing reports to each team chair, instead of distributing five copies to each team in the mailboxes.

Moderator's Report: Based on a request from the UCC, Marge requested prayers for the United Methodist Church in their deliberations this weekend on sexual gender issues in the Methodist church which have been plaguing the denomination for many years. The next quarterly Congregational Meeting will be on March 31 immediately after the Sunday worship service and will include evaluation of how the church team structure is working and an update on the sabbatical preparations.

New Business

Confirm Delegates to the Rocky Mountain Conference. Marge noted that our nominated church delegates for this year are Ron & Linda Rak, with Ron & Marge Erickson as alternate delegates, and asked Council to confirm the delegate appointments. Helen/Ann moved to confirm the 2019 delegate appointments; motion carried. There was brief mention of highlights of the June 6 - 8 RMC Annual Celebration meeting in Grand Junction. {NOTE: Ron & Linda plan to attend}.

Reports of Teams, Affiliated Organizations, and Committees

Facilities Team. Ron Hassell is Chair, Mark Wolters is Vice Chair, Bowie Duncan is Secretary. Meeting time is 6:00pm on the 2nd Thursday. At the first meeting they reviewed projects and members skills to make assignments for the various projects. Current emphasis is on finishing details to the three restrooms and converting the front entry restroom to unisex.

Faith Education Team. Ron E. reported that Arlene Waldorf is Chair and Ruby Hamilton is Vice Chair. Donna Maloney sat in the meeting to determine if she wants to serve on the team or teach Sunday school.

Worship Team. Co-chairs are Betsy Neas and Barb Groy and Ruthann Schoeffield is Secretary. A new plan idea from the first meeting is to celebrate birthdays on a monthly basis on the 4th Sunday to provide equal recognition for everyone. Perhaps the team will provide cake and even lunch.
