And I am grateful for those who faithfully work on a vaccine and treatment for those afflicted. We are blessed by them and grateful for their efforts.

As the Apostle Paul wrote to the Colossians, (3:17) "Whatever you do...do it all in the name of Jesus and give thanks to God the Father through him." Let us be all be grateful and appreciate what we have.

#### PRAYER MEDITATION FOR THESE TIMES **Listen to Your Children Praying**

Hear my cry, O God; listen to my prayer. (Psalm 61:1; read Psalm 61 in its entirety.)

The Psalmist prays about everything. He prays when he's happy. She prays when she succeeds against odds. He prays for strength. She prays for persistence. All of us are somewhat monastic during this time of pandemic and one thing that monks are known for is praying—morning, noon, and night, and in between. Every encounter is a call to prayer, to focus on God, to seek the highest good, to confront conflict evil and injustice without losing our cool and succumbing to insult and violence whether in words or action.

Prayer is soul force (satyagraha, as Gandhi says) that takes us beyond our bruised and fragile selves, our impatient and self-interested selves, to dwell on a higher plane where we face struggle with an awareness of God's vision for us at this time and place. Prayer doesn't preclude confrontation with personal and political injustice; but it helps us challenge wrong without behavior like those we oppose. Prayer recognizes our fallibility and need for grace, especially in times of stress. Prayer invites us to trust God's love regardless of how we are currently feeling.

The Psalmist reminds us that we can pray our pain and lament, our anger and anguish, as well as our gratitude and joy. The Psalmist wants us, as the hymn says, "to take everything to God in prayer."

These days we have to ask ourselves what would happen if millions of Christians—and persons of other faiths—took several minutes a day to pray for national healing, for guidance about how to respond to issues of pandemic, health care, racism, leadership, and earth care. We need to pray for our church's mission, members, and our own lives. You can pray your way through the church directory focusing on several members each day. So let us pray through day, our gratitude and concern, our fear and love, and let us pray for the healing of our nation and the earth, knowing that we may be the answer to our prayers by our commitment to be God's hands and feet.

Holy God, we take everything to you in prayer. We bring to you our joys and sorrows, successes and failures. Let us see your presence in every season of life and let us bless the world. Amen.








# View from the Mountain

#### "PATIENCE"



Patience, what is it anyway? I've come to believe that it is a trait that almost all of us want to develop. If we are not patient, our life decision will be hasty and impetuous. Also the way one bears pain and life trials is based on whether or not we have developed this trait we call patience.

So, how do we develop it? After much time looking into the answer to that, I believe I have found the path. The first thing we have to learn is how to be quiet, to shut the door so we can get in touch with our inner voice.

Then I believe the next step is discovering your expectation. Whatever the situation, you should try to understand what you want to happen, and then quietly figure how best to reach that goal.

The third trait is mindset. Once you think through the issue at hand, then you set your resolve to stick to your decision. Also, mindset suggests that you have a positive attitude in the first place.

You know, I think the hardest part of being a patient person is this business of expectation. I can speak for myself when I confess that I expect way too much of myself. When I was a teacher, my students had to teach me that each one learned differently. Each one comes with personal challenges. Plus, not all the parents gave a hoot if their kids did well in school. Many only stayed in school until they could legally get out of school and get a job. When I really learned this, my expectations were different for each child and my mindset was one of being safe and loving. The only way to achieve this was to get to know each student, and it meant I needed a lot of patience. I gladly gave it.

I know a wonderfully dedicated teacher and I discussed this business of patience in teaching. She teaches fourth grade where many of the students are Native American and come from very poor homes. My friend teaches math and any one who has ever taught math knows it is the teachers job to explain the concepts one by one. She knows that many won't understand, no matter how many times she goes back again. And because most of the parents don't make school attendance a priority, many are absent often. As she told me, "You can't teach math starting with the simplest concept if you have to go over it time after time after time."

And then she has some kids who want to learn in spite of the problems, so she must supply them with as much math knowledge as possible. When I asked her how she did it, her answer was, "I value education for them and they know that I know their life situation and I love them dearly." In other words, this teacher adjusted her expectations and held to her mindset to having patience so she could help them.

Where I live in assisted living, I have seen examples of unbelievable patience, such as a husband who took full care of his wife he called Sweety. The problem was that she had dementia that worsened regularly. Never did he come close to anywhere near losing his desire to care for and love her. Everyone here was in awe of his patience.

I also talked with a therapist who worked mostly with wounded children of all ages and their troubled parents. She said that never once has she lost patience with a child acting out or even displaying serious behavior problems. After we talked she said, "That is because my expectations are appropriate for each client and my mindset is one of safety and healing." And there it is.

I hope that we all can find our path to patience. I know I'm going to work on wanting things on my to-do list done right now. Waiting is hard for me, so I have to start with being quiet, checking my expectations, and accepting my mindset. How about you?

#### MARY KELLY REMEMBERS THE WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY

My first introduction to the Women's Home Missionary Society [as it was then called] was in September 1952 [shortly after moving to BV]. The meeting was at the home of Clara Esgar. There were about 25 women there. Mrs. Marion Wallace was President, and I soon discovered that they were a dedicated and hard working group. It was their work and devotion that had kept the church alive. As the church was in the little red brick one-room building on Tabor street, there was no room for meetings. The women met in their homes. There were three other one-room churches in town—The Catholic, Episcopal, and Baptist.

One of the ways the missionary society made money was with the Food Basket. Several items of baked goods were put in a sturdy basket with a lid (like a picnic basket). This was then passed around to church members who picked what they liked, put money in the basket and then passed it on. By the time the basket got back, there was a good amount of money in it and families could enjoy something besides their own cooking.

Because of the lack of space in the church, it was difficult to have a bazaar or sale, so after the new post office was built on the east end of Main Street (now Remax Realty), the old post office was vacant. This building is now Rustic Woods. The missionary ladies got permission to use the building for their bazaar. The partitions were still up in the post office and the bronze post boxes were still there. The lobby was used for the baked goods, and behind the boxes we put the rummage items, used clothing, and gifts.

I expect the reason I remember so well was because Carrie Wright made a huge batch of cake doughnuts and I made a batch of yeast doughnuts, and they were soon gone, along with the hot coffee. There was no place to sit down, so people just stood around and ate, drank coffee, and visited.

The world beyond us is made of tracks and scents on the wind. Skittering, burrowing, and flying things are everywhere. How often do we see them? An Arizona native, Craig Childs has published more than a dozen books of adventure, wilderness, and science, including *House of Rain*, *Animal Dialogue*, and *The Secret Knowledge of Water*. His most recent book is *Virga & Bone: Essays from Dry Places*. He is a contributing editor at Adventure Journal Quarterly and his writing has appeared in The Atlantic, Outside, and The New York Times, the latter calling him, "a modern-day desert father." Childs lives off the grid just outside Norwood, Colorado, at the foot of the San Juan Mountains.


#### **CHRISTIAN MISSION STILL IN NEED OF FOOD**

#### **Good News!**


The Listening/Visioning sessions are coming soon! The March sessions obviously were postponed due to the Covid-19 pandemic, but are now being rescheduled.

#### **CUCC Council Minutes - June 17, 2020**

7:12pm. Clerk's Note: Meeting conducted via Zoom due to the Colorado Stay-at-Home Order started on March 26 due to the nationwide Corona Virus Pandemic.

Present: Moderator Kathy Roman, Vice Moderator Mark Wolters, Pastor Rebecca Poos, Kay Allinger, Merilee Daugherty, Helen Duncan, Lesley Fagerberg, Ron Hassell, Kathy Keidel, Linda Rak, Ron Rak, Bob Stocker, Bill Waldorf. RMC Guests: Rev. Erin Gilmore (Associate Conference Minister), Moderator Mark Long (RMC Funding Coordinator & Treasurer of the Western Association), Rev. Karen Caton (Western Association Member at Large), and Rev. Sara B. Linn (Pastor – Creede Community Church).

Sign On and Greet, Welcoming and Opening Prayer: Moderator Kathy Roman began the meeting with a prayer.

#### CONTINUING BUSINESS

Reschedule Listening/Visioning Event: Council opened the meeting with a discussion with four of the five planned RMC team members regarding the postponed March 29-31 Listening/Visioning event with our congregation. Erin Gilmore noted that the session will have to be done virtually online or by phone call, letter, or email due to the current Covid19 situation, and this has never been done before. Leading questions were: What are we imagining? How to make this work? How does this sound to all of us? What is currently happening? Where do we want to go? The initial plan is to have two RMC team members listen to each participant in our congregation for a half hour time slot and take notes. Then the team would meet and share comments, looking for commonalities, what are we hearing, and what is important. Then the team will write a report, discuss this with the CUCC leadership, and decide how to get back to the congregation. How do we heal what needs to be healed?

Mark Long emphasized that the team should basically be viewed as consultants, not as decision makers. The decisions are up to our church.

Bill Waldorf said the schedule should be a priority. It was agreed to conduct the sessions the end of June to July 3, and July 6 to 10. Kathy Roman asked how the sessions would be conducted and expressly if some "prompting questions" had been prepared. The team affirmed that a format was prepared to ensure fair coverage of all issues with each individual. Rebecca noted that the process needs to consider current societal changes with the Covid crisis, such that some of the original concerns will not apply—"we are different now." She suggested that we put some of the prompting questions in the July newsletter and inform the congregation that each of us will be contacted by the Stewardship/Visioning Team to schedule feedback to the RMC team.

**RMC** Annual Celebration (Meeting): The RMC team noted that the Annual Meeting was now scheduled for July 6 to 17, with the keynote speaker being world-class theologian Susan Thistlethwaite. The meeting will be virtual and will stretch over several days; the schedule will be announced July 1. Rebecca noted that because of this format, not only our official delegates, but everyone in our congregation wanting to attend could view the meeting.

This ended the RMC portion of the meeting and the RMC team was excused from the remainder of the meeting.

#### **GENERAL BUSINESS AND REPORTS**

Minutes from the May Council Meeting were presented for corrections. Hearing none, the minutes stand approved as previously published in the June church newsletter.

Clerk's Report: Ron noted that there were no changes in the CUCC congregation since the May meeting.

**Treasurer's Report:** Treasurer Lloyd Martinez was not present for the meeting. Bill Waldorf referred to the prepared Treasurer Report for May 31. There were no serious concerns mentioned. A revised 2020 Budget has been prepared, but it cannot be approved until a full congregational meeting is called and scheduled. Rebecca reported that the UCC is offering a grant for audio/visual equipment (that doesn't need to be paid back) to upgrade equipment for current and anticipated virtual uses. Bill offered to take on the project and confer with our current A/V specialist Matthew Maloney as to equipment needs. Regarding online giving, Rebecca reported that a system has been selected, but that there are a few little kinks that need to be resolved. When completed, test runs will be made by selected individuals to prove the system.

**Moderator's Report:** Kathy Roman opened the floor for kudos and thanks for recent activities. She thanked: 1. The Facilities Team and volunteers Paul Dorfmeister, Rhonda Funston, Karen Bowers, and Janet Steiner for re-staining the church exterior; 2. Merilee Daugherty for her resilience in having to cancel WMS meetings, but trying to stick to the adopted schedule, only to have to cancel again; 3. Janet Steiner and Linda Rak for the thoughtful Mother's Day flowers that were delivered to all women of the church.

#### **CONTINUING BUSINESS**

**Resumption of Services and Activities:** Kathy Roman announced that, following the RMC recommendation, a Strategic Planning Team will be formed to address reopening of the church, and she has a list of possible members. Ron Hassell agreed to assist in assembling the team. Kathy Keidel suggested that the emphasis should be on an outside church, since statistically there is too much risk inside, and it will be difficult to enforce mask wearing. Several members agreed that they liked the idea of meeting outdoors.

Kathy also announced that an Executive Council (Moderators and Team Chairs) Meeting is scheduled for July 2. Agenda will be forthcoming.

#### TEAM REPORTS AND UPDATES

**Stewardship/Visioning Team:** Bob Stocker reported that the team did not meet in May. They will meet as soon as the RMC "Listening Team" sends them the "prompting questions" for the upcoming end-of-June Listening Sessions.

**Finance and Budget Team:** Bill and Lesley added that a big obstacle is how to engage those of the congregation who were dissatisfied with the 2020 Budget presented at the January Meeting.

**Faith Education:** Kathy Keidel reported that the teaching of the three children in the congregation has continued very successfully, even with the current community restrictions. The "church-in-a-box" which was given to each child was well received and going well with home-schooling style teaching.

**Worship Team:** Linda Rak reported that she is partnering again with Janet Steiner to distribute a Father's Day gift to every man in the congregation on Thursday, June 18. The team itself has not met to discuss anticipated reopening.

**Facilities Team:** Ron Hassell also reported that the team has not officially met for a couple of months, but that they stay in close communication by email regarding repair and improvement projects. Projects are getting done. The next priority is replacing the south doors in the sanctuary with some that are more energy-efficient.

**Outreach Team:** Helen reported that the team has developed a partnership with Jimmy Sellars of Salida with a group called "Partners for Community Action in Chaffee County." Their key project is "Adopt-a-Family" during the Covid crisis. However, all of the needy families in Salida and Buena Vista are being served, so the emphasis has shifted to Leadville, where the need is in the Latino community. A problem has surfaced with anonymity of the applicants using the current online application, which is being worked on. If the issue can't be resolved, Helen said the Team plan is to donate \$600 to Habitat, plus the budgeted \$600, for a total of \$1200 this year. Kathy Keidel suggested that another more family-oriented need might be Family Youth Initiatives (FYI). She will research the group and get back to Outreach.

The UCC "Strengthen the Church" annual appeal is scheduled for later this June, and there is an issue of getting the word out and trying to prioritize the program during this current crisis. The best we can do is to put an article in the July newsletter and accept what is contributed, and dutifully send our budgeted funds to the program.

#### AFFILIATED ORGANIZATIONS

**Women's Missionary Society:** Merilee reiterated that the group has not met and has no plans to meet in the near future. **Boy Scouts:** The BV Scout ninth-graders and another group of six-graders have developed plans for trips this year and are working towards their goals.

**OPEN FLOOR:** Bill commented on what he has learned about the importance of wearing masks in public. The bottom line is that it reduces the amount of virus particles that get into the air. Outside meetings are better than inside ones because of better ventilation. Inside, the vapors can stay concentrated around a person for up to ten minutes.

ADJOURNMENT: Meeting was adjourned at 9:12pm.

NEXT COUNCIL MEETING is scheduled for July 17, 7 pm.
