### **MODERATOR'S MOMENT**

As I prepare to take my leave as your moderator, I first want to say that I will never take leave of this church. You are all part of my community and I care deeply about each of you and the future of what I consider to be my spiritual home. I am proud and honored to serve, despite the challenges of dealing with conflict, dissention, and the ever-present threat of coronavirus, which seemingly has changed every aspect of how we interact with one another. As I ponder this past year I am reminded of the opening words of Ecclesiastes Chapter 3: To everything there is a season and a time to every purpose under heaven: A time to be born and a time to die; a time to plant and a time to pluck up that which is planted; a time to kill and a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up; a time to weep, and a time to laugh; and a time to mourn and a time to dance; ... a time to embrace and a time to refrain from embracing; ... a time to keep silence and a time to speak; a time to love, and a time to hate; a time of war, and a time of peace. (King James translation)

These are words which we've all heard or read at least once in our lives, but now that I reflect on their universality a little more, I am struck by how much they apply to our individual and collective lives at this particular time in our history. We look back over our own lives and that of our church, a church born over 140 years ago, founded by a small group of people who had the faith, strength, and dedication to make it grow and flourish, through good times and bad, all the while ministering to the spiritual needs of its community. We are now a community within that community, thanks to our founders and to all who persevered over those 140 years. We can rejoice and be grateful for that. The conflict that we have been experiencing is not the first in our history, nor will it be the last, but it will not tear us down. With the help of the Conference Listening Team and their perceptive report, your Church Council is working to help us to get to know each other better, to refine our purpose and identity so that we can envision our future as a church. Rather than as a "time to break down" or "time to pluck up that which has been planted," I see this as "a time to build up."

Envisioning our future as a church can mean change, which for some of us, myself included, is a bit threatening. As I've thought about it, I've decided that while the way we may do things differently in the future, our basic beliefs, our Christian values and our faith will remain constant. The way we do church may change, but the way we are church will not. To mourn or grieve what seems like a loss is natural and normal, and the Rocky Mountain Conference can offer us ways to do that together, to lead us toward acceptance and a "time to dance."

While the pandemic has kept us from meeting, visiting with friends, and sharing a meal together, this a time to "refrain from embracing," from "swapping air," as they say—praying and singing together and greeting our friends with hugs. Because I believe in science, a gift from God, I remain optimistic that with continued care and the help of a vaccine, I am hopeful that we will return to a "time to embrace" and to return to a time when we can enjoy all those things that are important to us as part of our church experience. Before we can do so, however, we will have to continue to show love for each other by protecting each other by not gathering, by wearing masks, and by observing physical distancing. It's been a long season, but we have all, each in our own way, endured longer separations, illnesses, and economic hard times. God gave us the fortitude to persevere and I am confident that He will again. We can pray for His guidance to bring us to "a time to love…and a time of peace" whatever that may look like in our personal and spiritual lives.

I miss you all. May God bless us all on our journey together and may all of our efforts please Him. I wish us all well in 2021, especially your future Moderators and Council. They are all sincere in their desire to serve you and our church well. I thank my Vice Moderator and current Council for their patience and dedication to this awesome responsibility.

I'm writing this a couple of days before Christmas, so I send Christmas greetings and wishes for a bright and hope-filled New Year. As I write, I'm ensconced in my living room chair, surgery foot perched on a blanket, ice machine flowing, church projects surrounding, with books to read, pills to take for pain, and dogs and cats snoring in a big circle around me. What else could a person ask for?!

Let me tell you what I see from my vantage point as our year draws to a close and a new one begins.

\*A congregation that pours out love and care with abandon. So many meals, safe visits, cards, letters, phone calls, and offers to help have come to so many, including the Pastor and her family. We have also reached out to folks in our wider circle—those checking out our church online and thinking about joining in fellowship with us in the new year.



type and her eyesight so dim that she couldn't see the keyboard, she's been dictating her columns to me. Every Wednesday I'd go buy take-out and we'd sit in her little apartment at Brookdale. We'd laugh and talk about writing and the writing life, then I'd break out the computer, which she never understood (she had long despised anything that smacked of technology), and she would dictate and I would type. What always amazed me is how week in and week out she'd come up with ideas to write to you about. The older she got, the more her imagination and creativity would come to life. It was like she could travel the world through the road of her imagination sitting in her soft leather chair. Saturdays were her writing days. She'd break out her little pad and squint her eyes, using a magnifying glass to see, and think and write.

I've found myself wondering—if she were writing a final column, knowing it to be her last, what would she want to tell you? I think there are a few themes that have guided her work for these past thirty years that she would want you to embrace. She would want you to be kind to animals. She's had a life-long love of animals. From her work with wolves, to her goat Willie T For Trouble, and to the cats that sat on her lap, she believed that the mark of a person's moral character was how a person cared for the most vulnerable, those that make up the animal kingdom. She'd want to tell you one last time to dedicate yourself to the care and well-being of animals.

She'd want to tell you about the love of family. Jean loved her husband Gene. He was the feature of many of her columns. We learned of their undying love for each other in their many adventures. She regaled us with stories of Granny and Grandaddy Pete. We loved the romance of her parents, Marion and Luby Peters. She had a long commitment to her brother Jim Peters in Florida and her nephews and nieces. Jean also loved her children, Clarke, Phoebe, Dede, and Katy. The death of both Dede and Katy broke her heart. Her loved embraced her grandkids in Kentucky, Florida, and Colorado. My children were blessed to be raised within the love of their Mema. She also extended her love to her son- and daughter-in-law Rebecca and myself. Jean loved her granddaughter-in-law Rachel. Jean loved it when Phoebe would bring her great grandson Holden to visit her. Jean would tell you in a last column to always forgive, enjoy, and love your families.

Jean would want you to live your life purpose. Discovering and living her purpose is what gave Jean so much drive in her life. Her life purpose was writing these weekly columns for the past thirty years. Jean loved the Winchester Sun which faithfully published her columns. She thoroughly enjoyed the town of Winchester. When the paper would come to her assisted living, she would cut out each column and put it in a memory album. Later in her career her columns were published in the Fairplay Flume, the Chaffee County Times, the Ouray County Plaindealer, and in her daughter-in-law's bulletin for Sunday worship. Jean would want to thank her editor, Whitney Leggett of the Winchester Sun. She'd thank Robert McAllister for creating a website to record her columns and for collating all of her columns in books that she read and treasured. I often wonder about the countless thousand lives she touched over the years. She would tell you to discover and live your life purpose.

In a last column she would tell you to be kind and compassionate to each other. Jean hated conflict and could not stand to be in the midst of it. She would do all she could to avoid hurting anybody's feelings. She wanted all people to be gentle and kind with one another.

As she contemplated a last column she would want to thank her daughter Phoebe for her undying love and care. Phoebe was her guardian, guide, and stay. She saw to Jean's comfort, security, and health. In the midst of the pandemic, Phoebe made sure Jean was cared for. Jean would also want to thank all of the caregivers at the Brookdale Assisted living in Littleton, Colorado.

Her last word to you would be to cherish life. Discover joy. Embrace every day as a new opportunity to celebrate the gift of being alive. Jean would tell you to enjoy the love of God and to believe in God's eternal care.

Ultimately, Jean doesn't have the last word. She would want you to continue the conversation as you brought her many life lessons to fruition.

Above and beyond anything else, she would tell you, her readers, "Thank you and I love you."

We were all blessed by her life. Her view from the Hill, and from the Mountain were wondrous things indeed.



Human trafficking has long been a problem throughout the world but has been increasing because of COVID-19 and stay-at-home orders. Not only are families becoming more financially desperate and turning to risky money-making opportunities, but people cannot go to brothels and strip clubs, so they have the girls




and boys brought to them instead or watch pornography on-line. This has caused a rise in trafficking, but there has also been a rise in awareness. We are seeing more people rescued from labor and sex trafficking and they need help.

One way we can help is by providing comfort and dignity at the time of their rescue. BV HOPE (bvhope.org) partners with Restore Innocence (restoreinnocence.org) to deliver bags full of much-needed items to the FBI which gives them to newly rescued trafficking survivors. Lists of items needed for each bag are posted in the CUCC narthex. The lists are very specific. It works best to partner with a friend to buy the whole content so we don't end up with a lot of partially empty bags.

Thank you so much for helping with this project! It is so needed and is a tangible way we can help those who have been suffering through trafficking.



#### **CUCC COUNCIL MINUTES - December 16, 2020**

7:11pm Meeting called to order. (Clerk's Note: Meeting conducted via Zoom internet due to the Colorado Stay-at-Home/Safer-at-Home Orders started on March 26<sup>th</sup> due to the nationwide Corona Virus Pandemic.)

**Present**: Moderator Kathy Roman, Vice Moderator Mark Wolters, Pastor Rebecca Poos, Kay Allinger, Merilee Daugherty, Helen Duncan, Judy Hassell, Betsy Neas, Linda Rak, Ron Rak, Bob Stocker, Bill Waldorf

Sign On and Greet, Welcoming and Opening Prayer: Moderator Kathy Roman began the meeting with a prayer.

#### GENERAL BUSINESS AND REPORTS

**Minutes** from the November 18 regular Council meeting were approved as published.

Minutes from the December 2 Special Council meeting were approved as written.

Clerk's Report: Ron noted several changes in the congregation since the November 18 meeting. Rebecca added that Diane Bails should also be reported for records continuity, although she was no longer a church member. Rebecca and CUCC will be hosting a Celebration of Life on Zoom for Diane Bails, Dec. 27 at 1:00pm. Bob Stocker questioned the difference in two of the listing categories of the report. Ron will review and modify the report categories to match those in the 2019 Annual Report to see if that clarifies Bob's question.

**Treasurer's Report:** Assistant Treasurer Judy Hassell and Finance Team Chair Bill Waldorf noted that income YTD was \$4,802 under budget. Bill offered that to balance the budget for the year, approximately \$5,390 would come from Reserves, depending on December contributions.

**Moderator's Report:** Kathy said that she had been attending recent RMC moderators meetings on Zoom. A key question discussed was how can voting at a virtual annual congregational meeting be conducted legally?

Strategic Planning Team update: Mark Wolters said the church building remains closed as advised by the county health department, due to alarming increases in the county's virus infection rate. However, he said that to his knowledge, there were no cases in our congregation.

Kudos and Thanks: Kathy noted that the Sunday YouTube services are showing significant leadership by several additional participants. She offered special thanks to VirJeanne Williams, Betsy Neas, and Trish Flint for their Christmas stories, as well as to Janet Steiner for the innovative Christmas on a Cookie Sheet presentation. Kathy also gave special recognition to the virtual worship music team including Matthew Maloney, Jacy Doumas, Rebecca, Shelby and Katie Lindsay, and Janet and the Choir carolers.

#### **CONTINUING BUSINESS**

**Nominating Committee Report**: Chair Judy Hassell reported that the 2021 Slate of Officers and Team members was almost complete. All teams have five members except for Faith Education with four. Merilee Daugherty has accepted nomination to Moderator, as has Betsy Neas for Vice Moderator, completing all officer positions.

#### TEAM REPORTS AND UPDATES

**Stewardship/Visioning:** Bob Stocker reported that the team hasn't met recently.

**Outreach Team:** Helen Duncan emphasized the Arkansas Valley Christian Mission request for hams, turkeys, and most of all cash donations to aid local families struggling, especially with job losses due to the pandemic. Many are in need of rent and utility assistance, plus supplies from the food pantry.

Chaffee County Habitat for Humanity has asked us to participate in an Advent Build via daily offerings of pocket change to a special "house" in the narthex. These collections need to be returned by the 23rd to the Habitat ReStore.

The final "5for5" UCC Christmas Fund special offering will be extended into January.

**Worship Team:** Linda Rak was happy to report that a short outdoor Christmas Eve service was in the planning, which would include caroling with lighted hand-held candles. The service is planned for 4:00pm, to be led by both Janet Steiner and Pastor Rebecca. A recorded service will also be on YouTube by 9:00am. (Ed. note: Outdoor service cancelled due to weather. Replaced with: Watch Party & Gathering On Air, 4-6:00pm on YouTube & Zoom.)

Facilities Team: Ron Hassell had sent a report ahead of time. There were no questions concerning it.

**Faith Education Team:** Betsy Neas reported that she will remain a member of the Team, and Donna Maloney has accepted the position of Team Chair. The team has also asked for \$100 to be added to their budget to cover the cost of a new program. Conversations that Matter will take a holiday hiatus and resume Sunday, Jan. 3<sup>rd</sup> at 4:00pm on Zoom.

Finance and Budget Team: Bill Waldorf went over the 2021 Proposed Budget in detail. Major changes include projected reduced indoor services until the third quarter which will reduce expenses, and reductions in pastoral benefits due to husband Clarke going on Medicare coverage, allowing selection of a less expensive family UCC major medical plan for 2021. Minor changes included eliminating summer Youth and Boy Scout Program costs. After end-of-year data are received, the Team expects to do a final review in early January when 2020 actual General Contributions are known and then to modify the Proposed Budget only to reflect a like amount. The Proposed Budget must be finalized by January 15 in order to have it available two weeks prior to the 2021 Annual Meeting. Merilee moved/Linda seconded to approve the 2021 Proposed Budget as presented.

Mark Wolters moved/Helen Duncan seconded and added an amendment regarding the early January modification of 2021 budgeted General Contributions. Bill added that the 2020 deficit when determined will have to be covered by reserve funds. Council approved the amended motion.

Affiliated Organizations-Women's Missionary Society: There were no questions.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

**The Annual Congregational Meeting will be on Zoom,** January 31, 2021, at 11:00am, following Online Worship & Zoom Coffee Hour.

**Team Annual Reports** are due to the Church Office no later than Wednesday, January 6. Packets of the reports, budget, nominating committee slate, etc., are to be available by Sunday, January 17<sup>th</sup>. Packets of reports, proposed budget, and nominees are to be available at that time.

**Presentation of the Annual Meeting:** Kathy asked: How are we going to run the Zoom Annual Meeting? How can it be inclusive such that all observers can participate? She suggested perhaps the sanctuary can be opened to those without computer access to provide TV video and audio. It was thought that a land line or a cell phone can be used to listen to the meeting and respond, without visual coverage. A legal opinion from the Conference attorney specifies that we assure all in attendance can be heard and that we would have to take a roll call vote. To her question whether people could email any questions which would then be read and answered, it was the consensus of the group that it would be permissible. Kathy will confirm these ideas at the next Rocky Mountain Conference moderators meeting.

**Topic for Next Special Meeting:** The date for the next special meeting was set for January 6 at 7:00pm via Zoom when we will continue reporting back on personal contacts and discussing our purpose and mission statement.

### **PASTOR'S REPORT**

Rebecca noted that increased participation has been observed in the Sunday services on YouTube, in the Conversations That Matter adult study, and during the TELLS book study. Based on these increased attendances, she is looking at everything we can do to widen the circle of participants and spread the word of the church.

Rebecca also reported her Designated Housing Allowance for 2021 would be \$7000. This designation must be noted in these December Council minutes each year and a form filed in the Office.

**PRAYER CONCERNS/UPDATES:** It was noted that Vivian York has taken a fall this past week and that Tom Rawlins had been placed in hospice care. (Tom Rawlins passed away on December 19, 2020) Pastor Rebecca asked us to reflect on a few new needs in the congregation for healing, hope, and comfort.

**ADJOURNMENT:** Meeting was adjourned at approximately 9:43pm.

NEXT REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING is scheduled for January 20, 2021, 7:00pm on Zoom.
