#### **MODERATOR'S MOMENT**

As I take on the yoke of Moderator, I want you to know those who served before me built a strong foundation for the members of our church, along with all those who choose to associate themselves with us. I do not intend to reinvent this church, merely to continue its growth toward being Christ's church. Thank you to all of you who chose to participate in the Annual Meeting on January 31.

Welcome to our newly elected Team members! A huge Thank You to Kathy Roman and Mark Wolters for their service as Moderator and Vice Moderator, respectively, over the last year. They worked hard for all of us, and with the COVID-19 restrictions, spent extra time figuring out how we might do church in person. They are not going away to rest; they have both signed on to be a part of the Facilities/Caring for the Church Team. They have also both volunteered to be on the committee seeking to bring our By-Laws up-to-date.

Since November, Council has met the first Wednesday of each month to focus on taking the results from the listening event last summer, along with your more recent feedback, to formulate who we should be as a congregation. In February, we set a small committee to work on a Mission/Purpose Statement. We are endeavoring to re-center on our Mission and Ministry role, finding ways we can all participate, regardless of age or ability. Participation builds family, because we spend quality time together.

### PASTOR'S ARTICLE, March 2021

"I look to the mountains! Where does my help come from? My help comes from the Lord, the Creator of heaven and earth." (Psalm 121)

This is my favorite Psalm. Especially living here in the majesty of the mountains. I look to the mountains a lot—not that the *mountains* themselves are the source of our help, but the Creator of the mountains and of us all is, and the mountains are a wonderful reminder of our Maker's Presence all around us—as easy as a glance out the window!

This year, due to foot surgery, I can't walk up to the mountains, or even out on Ice Lake to ponder the mountains, as I have for many years on my prayer walks. But one of the Gifts of this time of "being made to lie down—or at least sit down—in green pastures," my forced Sabbath, has been exploring spiritual metaphors, and now taking "prayer sits" instead of walks. It's amazing how far your mind and heart can travel creatively and imaginatively when they have to!

We continue on our Lenten Journey this month. We are learning about Prayer—in many forms, expressions, and practices. I hope you'll engage the Journey—learning about and practicing prayer on your own, and also Zooming in with us and Grace Church every Weds. at 6:00 pm. Let's "look to the mountains" daily, even hourly, as an act of prayer for this season. We are blessed that it's easy for us here to do this!

We also consider looking at Lent through new eyes this year. Traditionally, Lent has been looked at as a time of somber penitence and "giving something up" to focus more fully on our spiritual lives without distraction. But we've already lived through a *year* of Lent, if you think about it! COVID started in the middle of Lent last year, and we might feel like we've never left! Perhaps we've given up enough.

We've given up many of our usual joys and things that fill our spirit reservoirs: Gathering in worship and uplifting fellowship. Hugs, singing the songs of our faith, communing together with "real touch." Real, tangible bread and cup and physical presence. We've been forced to *stop* in our busy tracks and *reflect deeply* on what matters. What we truly need and value in life. What Jesus would have us do in loving God, neighbor, and self in these tumultuous times. We've all been on a kind of "forced Sabbath" of body and soul.

This Lent, this "lengthening" of days and spiritual muscles, what if we look at Lent through fresh eyes in this different kind of year? What if we "lean in?" Lean into life more fully—not just live on the surface anymore. Lean into learning more about Jesus. Embrace the faith journey more fully. Lean into scripture and spiritual practices.

On Ash Wednesday we are reminded: "You are created from dust and to dust you shall return." We are in fact, Dust! Earth! Humus! We can be "humbly mindful" as we remember this. Yes, we are dust, but we are earthly dust, part of the soil, part of creation with one another. And dust is *good*, after all; it is the place of fecundity, of moist dark soil, and germinating new life, promising seeds and growth. Lent invites us to take a "beauty break," open to the awe-filled, precarious world in which we live. Remember we are dust –earthy, but also stardust.

Life is beautiful, but often too short. A Jewish saying counsels that each person should have a note in each pocket. In one pocket, the note should announce "for you the universe was created." In the other, "you are dust." What about a note on the mirror, or at your bedside table, or in your journal?

I invite us to take a new look at Lent this year. Take a Pause, pray, gaze at the mountains every now and then—or several times a day—throughout this Lenten journey of Prayer. God is found in the pausing, if we will look.

### WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY NEWS

"We always give thanks to God for all of you and mention you in our prayers, constantly remembering before our God and Father your word of faith and labors of love and steadfastness of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ. For we know sister's in Christ that you are beloved by God, that he has chosen you." (1st Thessalonians 1:2-4)

The letters of Paul to the early churches at Corinth, Ephesus, Galatia, Thessalonica, and Phillippi make it clear that if you choose to follow Christ, there will always be times when our faith is tested, that there will be disagreements, loneliness, fear and despair. This past year with so many of our daily and weekly rituals turned upside down, we have had to rely on God's leading and sustaining love in a whole new way.

I have spent many hours sorting old documents and files from responsibilities of the past. Notebooks and journals full of writings from seminary classes, retreats, seminars, meetings and conferences, presentations for National Spiritual Growth and Prayers Conferences with American Baptist Women and Church Women United, USA. Travel notes with the Board of International Ministries to visit Mission work in the Orient, Central America, Mexico, Cuba, and the Philippines. Also I have spent time going through pictures and notes from trips searching for family roots in Sweden, Norway, Denmark, England, Scotland, and Ireland. Doing genealogy with my sister, Nancy, has been very exciting to find our family roots in America go back to the 1700.

One document which I discovered was my Service of Ordination to the Christian Ministry, from Sunday, September 13, 1992. On the front of the bulletin, enclosed in an elliptical circle, with a cross and a circular line rising to the top of the bulletin are these words

#### HARMONY - GROUNDING - SOLITUDE - COMPASSION

These four words have guided my years of ministry since that time. I studied at United Theological Seminary, a Congregational Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota from fall of 1989 to 1992. My call following Seminary was to the University of Wisconsin, LaCrosse, an Ecumenical ministry, representing five denominations, to Crossroads Campus Ministry. It's hard to believe that this is all almost 30 years ago now. My ordination to ministry was a new beginning in my Christian journey after spending some 20 years as an Executive Director in three YWCAs in three places—Beatrice, NE, Winona, MN, and LaCrosse, WI. The YWCA's main goal was the "Elimination of Racism," along with increasing the well-being of women and girls, providing shelter and work.

The words I have mentioned above come from a formative book from Ron's years of working on a Doctor of Ministry degree from United Seminary. The book entitled "Mutual Ministry - New Vitality for the Local Church" by James Fenhagan gives us the following insights: "IF we are serious about the Christian journey, the place to begin is not with how we say our prayers but with how we spend our time. The Christian journey is to discover the kind of harmony that reflects the humanity of Christ and therefore the best humanity that is ourselves. The Christian journey is a journey to wholeness and service to others." Let us continue to support our ministries of caring, even in this difficult time.

We are looking forward to the time we can gather together as a group, Some have mentioned a picnic as soon as the weather would allow. I would appreciate hearing your ideas of how and when we could be together.








# View from the Mountain

#### "DETOUR"





But something went very wrong and his health did not continue to come back. Fatigued to his depths, he was unable to do any simple exercises, right down to the essential lung clearing exercises he had to do daily. He quit speaking, gesturing that he simply could not find the strength to do any of it. What he did say he said in breathy whispers, and because of all that, pneumonia settled in both lungs.

Day after dark day he lay in intensive care, detached and getting weaker and weaker. Every so often, as he felt the need to communicate, he fell into sign language. He found by simply moving fingers to form words he was able, with the least amount of effort extended, to stay connected a little bit with other human beings. But other than that, Ray, at age 68 was slipping away from the world. Quietly, with eyes closed and body still. He really seemed to be saying, "That's all. I'm out of touch. I've lost the connection, so I can't go on."

The picture was bleak and everyone was so sad. The only one who knew him best felt that he seemed trapped and was just giving up on life and that was his problem. One night she leaned down close to his ear and said, "Ray, you love to sing. Ray, if you can't speak or you can't sign, then sing to us." There were family members in the room, and they thought she was out of line. I mean how in the world could anyone sing when they couldn't talk?

It was totally silent in that hospital room. Had he even heard her? Then his mouth opened and it was like angels came. Low at first, then bold, he sang Amazing Grace.

Amazing Grace, how sweet the sound That saved a wretch like me. I once was lost, but now I'm found, Was blind, but now I see.

He sang it beautifully. As the family stood around his bed, they had surely witnessed a miracle. Tentative at first, his words gained in strength with every word, and at the end Ray lay in the Light. And in the Light he reconnected and began in that instant new strength which eventually healed this man named Ray.

Now I did not know this family, but I had heard of Ray—a Godly man who loved people and loved to share what life was teaching him. The miracle was that God provided a detour to tell his life lessons. I am humbled by this story.

The view from the mountain is wondrous!

Jesus was a common man, able to slip through a crowd unseen, and often not recognized by religious authorities.

Don West (1906-1992) could as well. The son of Georgia sharecroppers, he was a poet, editor, professor, teacher, coal miner, farmer, pastor, labor organizer who immersed himself in the lives and stories of "peasants, slaves, and workers." During high school he led a protest against the showing of the racist film "Birth of a Nation."

Inspired by the Danish Folk School Movement, he is perhaps best known as co-founder of the Highlander Folk School in Tennessee. It was begun to "teach Appalachians about their progressive history and to train activists and union

organizers." It helped train and support the non-violent work of Rosa Parks, Martin Luther King, and John Lewis.

Deeply rooted in the social gospel and an ordained Congregational Christian and United Church of Christ minister, West developed a curriculum that affirmed the heritage of Appalachian kids, published the songs of Kentucky miners, and defended those who were falsely accused. Hounded by newspapers, he once had to flee a lynch mob, and the KKK burned down his home. In later life he and his wife organized the Appalachian South Folklife Center in West Virginia.

West was an extraordinary writer, and although he studied at the University of Chicago and Columbia, he chose to write in a common vernacular. His activism was controversial, and in the 1940s the House Un-American Activities Committee went after him. His family had to hide and serious academic work and his ministerial standing were laid aside in a difficult time. Later, however, he reconnected with the UCC and its social justice.

Here is one of his poems:
I was raised on a hillside farm
Where my Daddy's sweat
Salted down the red clay.
I'm the son of my mother
The woman who plods between the cotton rows—
And I'm an Agitator!

### Lemuel Haynes: Recognized in Vermont in 2018, by Bill Whiteman, Feb. 2019

He was an illegitimate child in Puritan New England. His mother was a white servant girl and his father was an African slave. A few months after his birth in West Hartford, Conn., his mother abandoned him and he spent his early years as an indentured servant. Yet Lemuel Haynes (1753-1833) is someone to remember. Last fall, the Vermont Division for Historic Preservation dedicated a Historical Marker to honor his life and thought. His story is part of our UCC past.

After his indenture expired, during the Revolutionary War Haynes served as a minuteman. Later he studied with clergy to become a minister and was ordained in 1785—the first African-American minister ordained in a mainstream denomination in the United States.

For two years, Haynes served a Congregational church in Torrington, Conn. New members were joining the church and although he was well received, racial prejudice among some influential members prevented his installation. Finally, in 1788, he moved his family to the wild frontier of Vermont where he became pastor at West Parish of Rutland. His church grew from 42 members to about 350 during his thirty-year ministry. He was a black pastor in a white church and Vermont was a society of independent settlers.

Haynes preached and wrote about the slavery issue repeatedly. When white Christians wanted to liberate slaves and send them back to Africa (the Colonization movement), Haynes argued that the revolutionary war promised liberty for all Americans. He wrote extensively about how combining Republican ideas and Calvinistic theology could end slavery and cultivate interracial accord. By blending new American political convictions and longstanding Christian theological ideas, Haynes insisted that freeing slaves would do more than simply liberate them. Rather, ending slavery would provide happiness and security for all citizens throughout the new nation. Haynes never faltered in his efforts to convince people of the "equality of all [humanity] before God."

#### A MOMENT FOR SPIRITUAL REFLECTION

Good News in Action, by Rev. Dr. Bruce Epperly

Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news." (Mark 1:14-15; see Mark 1:9-15)

In just a few verses, Mark describes Jesus' baptism, temptation in the desert, and the beginning of his ministry. Chosen as God's beloved and blessed, Jesus faces the temptations of greatness and survival – comfort, power, and security. He places his temptations in God's hands, trusting God and his own sense of mission. Now Jesus is ready to get to work.

Now is the time. God vision has come to earth, it is here in our world. Now is the time to repent, turn around and believe the good news that God is with us and will give us what we need to be faithful companions in God's mission.

We need good news. For many of us, good news is on the horizon. We have received our COVID vaccine or are lined up for an appointment. We see the light at the end of the tunnel. But, we know that good news doesn't mean our troubles are over. February and March will be difficult months with potential COVID variants. There will be much pain and inconvenience, and we will be tempted to be impatient. But we need to see the good news and then be the good news.

How can you be good news? How can you turn around and let go of negativity and become a gospel witness?

Good news is many faceted but it means, at the very least, our willingness to be lights in the world, living by the values of faith, hope, and love; bringing goodness and mercy to our encounters; safely reaching out to others; being positive in our realism; and acting with grace and reconciliation. We are the hands, feet, heart, and words of God to the world around us.

We have good news to share. God is with us. God's realm is here.







### **CUCC Council Minutes - February 17, 2021**

7:07pm Meeting called to order. (Clerk's Note: Meeting conducted via Zoom internet due to the Colorado Stay-at-Home/Safer-at-Home Orders started on March 26<sup>th</sup> due to the nationwide Corona Virus Pandemic.)

**Sign on and Greeting: 7:07 p.m.** Moderator Merilee Daugherty, Vice Moderator Betsy Neas, Pastor Rebecca Poos, Helen Duncan, Marjorie Erickson, Judy Hassell, Donna Maloney, Linda Rak, Ron Rak, Bob Stocker, Bill Waldorf

Welcoming and Opening Prayer: Moderator Merilee Daugherty began the meeting with a prayer.

#### GENERAL BUSINESS AND REPORTS

**Minutes** from the January 20 regular Council meeting were approved as written. The February 3 Listening Session minutes were similarly approved.

**Clerk's Report:** Ron reported one change to the congregation since the beginning of the year: Bob Tolar and Debra Olsen-Tolar were re-added to the rolls by their request on January 28, as non-members-active.

**Treasurer's Report**: Merilee confirmed that Assistand Treasurer Judy Hassell has permission from Treasurer Lloyd Martinez to vote for him at Council meetings. Finance Team Chair Bill Waldorf reported that there are two new contributors to the church from January records. He was pleased to announce that he successfully completed a PPP loan application with Collegiate Peaks Bank on February 12, which if approved will pay salaries for church's employees Pastor Rebecca, custodian Leonard Nyberg, and Office Communications Administrator Nancy Best. The loan can also be used, if there are enough funds, to pay for church utilities. He wanted to include pianist Judy Phelps, but the fact that she was a private contractor in 2020 disallowed that.

**Moderator's Report:** Merilee reported that the February 3 Listening session went well. She, Betsy, and Pastor Rebecca also attended the recent RMC's "Healthy Congregations—Equipping Leaders with Tools for Vitality" workshop online, thought that it was well worthwhile, and recommended the next offering of this same Workshop to others in the church, either March 6 or April 24. Another segment on May 22 on "Conflict Transformation Skills for Churches" on Zoom is strongly recommended. Merilee is willing to sign folks up for these future workshops.

### **CONTINUING BUSINESS**

**Purpose and Mission Statement Committee** is currently composed of Betsy Neas, Bob Stocker, and Helen Duncan. The Listening Committee will plan on reviewing initial Statements at the next meeting on March 3.

**Bylaws Revision Committee:** A committee has been formed composed of Kathy Roman, Mark Wolters, and Merilee. Work will begin soon and will also include updating Council's Policy and Procedures as needed.

**Setting Goals:** Merilee encouraged Council to set a limited number of priority goals for this year. Immediate suggested by Merilee are "Extravagant welcome," "Faith Education," and "Mission." Extravagant Welcome was discussed, Education and Mission will be discussed in the future.

### TEAM REPORTS AND UPDATES

**Outreach Team:** Helen Duncan suggested a special community service when the church re-opens and invite all the users of the church (groups AA, Al-Anon, Strong Women, Friday community dance, etc.) to congratulate them for participating in the life of the church and to show a true interest in them. She also suggested renewed emphasis on mission trips for the future. An idea for future newsletters is for people to write in and share some of their mission trip experiences in articles to build interest in mission trips and local outreach. The first UCC special offering for the year is One Great Hour of Sharing which will be featured in March.

**Worship Team:** Linda Rak reported that the Ash Wednesday imposition of ashes as a drive-by event went fairly well, with about 13 participants. The evening Ash Wednesday service on Zoom was a joint presentation with Grace Church and our church with 40 people tuning in. Rebecca announced that Lenten virtual services via Zoom will be coordinated with Grace Church through March 24. The topic is Worship and Reflection on prayer and healing.

**Faith Education Team:** Donna Maloney noted that the team is still keeping in touch with the Tucker family children and will be sending some children's project materials by mail to the family. A new topic for Conversations That Matter, our adult education program, has been selected to start on February 21. "Who Stole My Bible?" by Rev. Jennifer Butler will be ordered and discussed.

**Affiliated Organizations—Women's Missionary Society:** Marjorie Erickson asked for guidance on trying to include approximately five WMS members at home coffee gatherings to offer limited discussion forums to help members cope with separation anxiety, lack of social connection, etc., caused by the virus pandemic. It was hoped that with increasing vaccinations, these meeting will be increasingly possible.

#### NEW BUSINESS

**Pastoral-Congregational Relations Committee (PCRC):** Helen Duncan is chairing the committee, with current members Arlene Waldorf, Mike Evans, and Ron Erickson. They are looking for one more member. Helen asked Council to approve the current committee. Betsy moved/Donna seconded to approve the initial committee. Motion carried.

#### Pastor's Report

Rebecca is looking forward to getting off crutches and participating in musical recordings for the Sunday services. She expressed much gratitude for all the support in the form of casseroles, soup, visits, and teamwork during her surgery-recovery time. She had good news about her postponed Sabbatical, such as that she may request an extension of the timeline for the Lilly Grant due to COVID and pursue the planned Scotland study into 2022. She announced that Office Communications Administrator Nancy Best has asked for a month off to travel this summer. Council will need to cover for her absence.

Rebecca has been meeting with the Moderators and other Team leaders and Officers to launch into the new year with good organization and communication for a healthy congregation. One current area of focus is better coordination and communication of Pastoral/Congregational Care. Currently, congregational members assist the pastor in caring for and connecting with church folks, but the communication chain is not complete. Rebecca is also working with community organizations and social services to learn how we best support our folks in collaboration with other agencies and has been invited to attend community meetings for coordination and education for CUCC.

**Prayer Concerns/Updates:** Rebecca closed the meeting with several immediate prayer concerns and updates, followed by a prayer.

Adjournment: Meeting was adjourned at approximately 8:50pm.
