BETTY GWYNN CELEBRATED IN THE CHAFFEE COUNTY TIMES

Betty Gwynn celebrated her 100th birthday with her family on December 26, 2021. She was born in Fremont, Nebraska, and her parents moved the family to Wyoming when she was four years old. Upon graduating from high school in Thermopolis, Wyoming, she attended Beth-El Nursing College in Colorado Springs from 1940-1943 and joined the US Army Nurse Corp in 1943.

In April, 1944, she was stationed in England at a field hospital established to treat the casualties from D-Day. Betty remembers sitting on the steps of Hut #124 where they lived and watching the airplanes, each one pulling a glider, go over at tree top level on D-Day. The nurses did not know what was happening



except for short news releases posted on their bulletin board. After VE Day, she was sent to Paris to give vaccines to troops being sent to the war in the Pacific. While there, she had the opportunity to tour France, and the highlights for her included seeing the Folies Bergère, the French Riviera and Notre Dame. She achieved the rank of 1st Lieutenant and outranked her husband Norton, who stood at attention and saluted her every morning.

Nort and Betty, high school sweethearts, were married on May 6, 1946. They were married 71 years. Norton was going to make a career out of the Navy until he contracted tuberculosis. After his discharge, he attended pharmacy school at CU. Betty took care of their children and worked as a nurse at hospitals in Denver and Boulder.

After he graduated in 1954, Norton, Betty and their children moved to Salida where he worked for Salida Drug and Betty worked at the hospital. Nort was recruited by the editor of the BV paper to take over the drugstore in Buena Vista. In 1958, Betty and Nort moved their family to Buena Vista and established Gwynn's Pharmacy on Main Street. Betty kept the books and helped Norton in the store. The rest of their lives they've lived in Buena Vista.

Betty continued her career as a nurse, working for Columbine Nursing Home and the hospital in Leadville. She also worked in the library at the BV High School and one year drove a school bus. She belongs to Eastern Star, the Gas Creek Home Demonstration Club, and the Monarch Quilters. She has been a member of Congregational United Church of Christ since her move to Buena Vista. She remembers that the church was in the little brick building behind Bev's Stitchery at that time.

Betty has four children, Steve, Nancy, Ken and David, five grandchildren and five great-grandchildren and still lives in her Buena Vista home with her son Ken and his wife Judy.

BACKPACK PROGRAM ARTICLE FROM THE CHAFFEE COUNTY TIMES—Dec. 22, 2021



One of Buena Vista's longest running food assistance programs is seeking additional volunteers and funding support. The

Backpack food program serves between 60 and 75 youth every week and has been in operation for over a decade.

"We do breakfast, lunch and dinner for two days, Saturday and Sunday," said program coordinator Ken Rehborn. "That's the point of this, so that they're not hungry at the weekend." Rehborn said he took over the program 7 years ago when the previous coordinator moved away.

On Thursday morning, Dec. 16, a half dozen or so junior Optimist Club members from Chaffee County High School gathered with a handful of adult volunteers to pack bags from the program's storage pantry at Congregational United Church of Christ.

"We store all the food here and this is where the packing is done. But it's not really a religious project. It's sort of a community thing," said Helen Duncan, the program's outreach committee chairwoman. The program relies primarily on volunteer efforts and donations for operations and funding, she said. "This year I applied for a grant through the Chaffee County Community Foundation and got \$2,000. But I hope we don't have to apply for grants every year," said Duncan.

Funding comes from private donors and local organizations, such as New Bee's Thrift Store, Monarch Quilters, and several organizations working through Grace Church. A self-contained program that runs strictly on volunteer labor and community donations avoids red tape that often comes part and parcel with food assistance programs.

"It's really quite open. They used to have a signup sheet where you had to list your income and your phone number and your name. I said you know what? Let's just feed kids. So I got away from all that," said Rehborn. "You need 70 meals? I'll get the groceries for two weeks for 70 meals. And then I just put in for reimbursement."

School teachers and staff help Rehborn adjust the number of meals prepared. He coordinates with Winchell and others at the beginning of each school year to plan and regularly thereafter to adjust. Food is packed Thursday mornings and taken by CCHS Junior Optimists to CCHS and the Grove preschool, which doesn't hold class sessions on Fridays. Adult volunteers deliver to the BV Boys & Girls Club on Friday. More volunteers are desired for food organizing and packing on Thursdays and donations are needed to ensure the program continues to operate.

"We take food donations, or prepared food items. Any monetary donations are always appreciated. The checks need to be made out to CUCC and memoed Backpack Program," said Rehborn.

When: starting February 4, Fridays, noon to 2:00pm


Where: the Sunday School wing, both men's and women's bathrooms and showers. Room 7 will be the hospitality/waiting room.

CUCC COUNCIL MINUTES - January 19, 2022

Welcome and Opening Prayer: 7:10pm Moderator Merilee Daugherty, Pastor Rebecca Poos, Kay Allinger, Helen Duncan, Marjorie Erickson, Judy Hassell, Ron Hassell, Donna Maloney, Betsy Neas, Linda Rak, Ron Rak, Bill Waldorf. Moderator Merilee Daugherty welcomed everyone and shared an opening prayer.

Minutes of the December 15, 2021 Council Meeting as published in the January Newsletter were approved.

General Business & Reports

Clerk's Report: Ron Rak reported no change in the congregation since the December meeting. The 2021 End-of-Year Clerk's Report showing all changes to the congregation will be published in the 2022 Annual Meeting report.

Treasurer's Report: Bill Waldorf discussed updated changes to the proposed 2022 Budget. A few errors were noted by Council members in the proposed final copy which will be corrected before the Annual Meeting. Rebecca also suggested that the 2021 Original Budget numbers needed to be included to provide a better comparison with the proposed 2022 Budget and comprehensive overview for the congregation. Judy Hassell said the financial officers held a meeting recently for training and to go over all aspects of the finances and would continue to look at the accounts, processes, and budget lines in depth in the coming year. Judy moved/Helen seconded that the 2022 Budget after corrections be approved by Council. Motion passed.

Moderator's Report: Merilee noted that all **Team annual reports** are ready for inclusion in the Annual Report. She asked Council for **guidance on how the Sunday worship** should be conducted in the near future considering the current county COVID virus situation. Consensus of several members was that we should resume in-person church services in three weeks (February 6) to offer the best sense of community relationship. Others preferred meeting sooner on January 30. Ron Rak suggested we prepare to offer higher protection face masks for those needing them to reduce risk and clearly note our concern and precautions in the weekly email blasts leading up to the 30th. It was agreed to resume in-person worship on the 30th. The church **Bylaws** final changes also need to be agreed upon before the Annual Meeting (see Nancy's Friday January 14 email blast with attachments for the proposed changes and a separate explanation page). Editor's note: Following the January 16 congregational discussion and January 19 Council meeting, the Bylaws were carefully revised one more time, incorporating the changes and questions from the discussions. They are now in every email blast and available in the narthex—bright orange cover!

Team Reports

Outreach: Helen Duncan updated Council on the proposed Shower Ministry for persons experiencing homelessness, a new recently suggested community outreach program. A meeting was held with Mike Orrill, co-chair of the Salida Housing Coalition and former pastor of First Presbyterian Church in Salida, which has had this ministry for several years. Study and preparations are well underway at CUCC, with an enthusiastic group of volunteers. A meeting with Sol Vista Health is planned next to learn about dealing with mental health situations that might arise. Possible grant money is available to support startups and will be pursued, although startup supply costs are expected to be minimal, anticipating volunteer donations, and CUCC has reserve funds for this type of community outreach. Scheduled start of the ministry is Friday, February 4.

WMS: Marge Erickson noted that WMS has been meeting in-person. A new Vice President for the year is being sought. They are planning programs around the theme of "Care of Creation," including Celtic author John Philip Newell's writings about 14th century mystic Julian of Norwich Celtic wisdom in his book *Sacred Earth, Sacred Soul*.

New Business

Merilee encouraged teams to try and first use monies from their restricted funds rather than budgeted funds in the new year to reduce church expenses.

The Annual Meeting will be held in-person only, noting the consensus is that hybrid meetings which include online Zoom participants result in poor communication with the Zoom attendees due to audio issues. It was noted that we must have an updated list of congregation members available at the meeting to ensure that only members vote when required.

Church Officers: Treasurer (Lloyd Martinez), Assistant Treasurer (Judy Hassell), and Financial Secretary (Helen Duncan) are required to be approved by Council, mandated in the Bylaws. Merilee moved/Betsy seconded they be approved. Motion carried.

Team names for official inclusion in the bylaws was questioned. Helen suggested that shorter names seem to be remembered and work best in documents. It was agreed to use shorter names in the final published bylaws.

Pastor's Report

Pastor Rebecca mentioned that supplies are already being donated for the Shower Ministry and are being stored in Room 8.

The sanctuary sound system renovation is well underway. She expects that the new capabilities will help increase use of the building by the community for different events as well as greatly enhance our congregation's music quality and hearing capability in worship.

Local resident Sue Greiner is promoting a green environmental approach to the recently published Sangre de Cristo Electric anti-green-conservation vision for the future. Rates for lower energy users are apparently going up, while the costs for higher users is going down. This appears to be a near-term cost issue for the church energy use. Rebecca forwarded to Council members some background information so we can be informed as a church and co-op member.

BV's Chaffee County High School's students will be losing some support programs from the school system this year, with the sale of their building and reduction in budget/staff. Rebecca is particularly concerned about support for LGBTQ youth and mentoring support for at-risk students. Rebecca asked us to think about how our church can support these new needs in the near and distant future.

Local resident Lois Arndt and friend of CUCC is planning to offer a caregiver support group for those in the congregation and the wider community.

Open Floor

Marge asked the Facilities Team to look into replacement of the aging kitchen food cooler, which makes a lot of noise when operated. Ron Hassell noted the age of the motor and motor mounts may be the problem. Facilities will research to repair or replace. The WMS has been raising funds for several months for this new appliance.

Prayer Concerns/Updates

Rebecca ended the meeting with several updates, joys, and concerns, followed by a closing prayer.

Adjournment

Meeting was adjourned at 8:40pm.
