MODERATOR'S MOMENT

Lately when I stop at the gas pump and see the prices, my first reaction is, "Oh no! How can this be?" Then I think about Ukraine and say a little prayer, "God, this is for Ukraine. This is the least we can be doing." And I don't feel badly, but rather feel relieved that I can be doing something.

Ukraine seems to be on all of our minds from what I can figure out. Over three million women and children have fled their country for Poland and other countries. So many of them are little children caught up in all the confusion. I saw a news clip of a little 7-year-old boy who was crying, wandering around in his warm winter clothes in Kiev, looking for someone to help him. He seemed so lost and who knows what happened to his parents. All the men 18-60 must stay in Ukraine to fight Putin's War. How can such a poverty stricken country fight a powerful nation like Russia?

That reminds me of the Old Testament Bible story of David and Goliath. Does Ukrainian President Volodymr Zelensky feel like David might have felt when he stood up to the giant and the Philistines? When interviewed for a news piece, Zelensky said he was a Russian Jew and his family has had to struggle all his life. He said it so matter of factly that it sounded like just another chapter of his life! I wonder if living that way gives him the courage to die for his country. He has faced death and risen above fear to the extent that he will stay in Ukraine's capital and lead his soldiers. Where does that courage come from to stand up to such a mighty power?

There was a headline in *Euroweekly* that said, "RUSSIAN SOLDIERS CAPTURED IN UKRAINE WILL LITERALLY BE DELIVERED BACK TO THEIR MOTHERS." It concluded with, "We, Ukrainians, unlike Putin's fascists, are not at war with mothers and their captive children." How can they be such gracious people to return enemies back to their mothers? Where does that kind of grace and courage come from? It comes from their deep spiritual belief in God.

Maria Shriver wrote in her *Sunday Newspaper*, "The Ukrainian people showed the world who they are: strong, tough, patriotic, scrappy, strategic, united." All of those are great words to describe Ukrainians, but the most important one to me is united. People can do wonders when they are united. United as a country, community, or church.

When I was with Habitat for Humanity in Denver, I was a coach for a family that was working to buy their home. They were living in the projects. The mother said to me that when she sent her five children to school, she would always tell them to stick together. She would demonstrate how easily one matchstick could be broken, but when she put five matchsticks together, they couldn't be broken. We can learn a lesson from the Ukrainians and this Habitat mother about courage and being united.

We also can be courageous like David. We as beloved children of God can do what God is calling us to be and do. We can welcome all people and help those on the margins have a better life. We can also help the Ukrainians through the One Great Hour of Sharing Offering and/or a special offering found on the UCC website. We have the courage to help usher in the Kingdom of God here on Earth.

PASTOR'S ARTICLE, April 2022

This is definitely a time when we need to see beauty, we also need to create beauty out of the ashes and destruction around us. (Christine Sine, Godspacelight)

On Ash Wednesday, we reflected on finding and creating "Beauty out of Ashes." Spiritual writer and teacher, Christine Sine, continues to explore that theme with us through Lent—a Lent that finds us in a time of human-caused devastation and great suffering—some days full of far more ashes than beauty, it seems.

"I want to share a story of what happened when the tallest tree in Wales got damaged by a storm and was supposed to be cut down. Instead, chainsaw artist Simon O'Rourke found a better solution to symbolize the tree's last attempt to reach the sky. He carved the sculpture (below), a beautiful image of a hand reaching towards the sky from the tree trunk.

All of us feel we are living on the frontlines at present. Whether it is because we are filled with horror of the conflict in Ukraine or the fear that as prices rise we will not be able to make ends meet. We feel that ugliness surrounds us, not beauty, yet we need the hope that these offer us.

Surely this is a time to embrace the beauty of creation—not just the creation we see around us, but the broken and scarred creation of fallen people and fallen trees, the ashes of ruined lives and those that suffer everywhere in the world. Beauty can be created from the ashes, but it takes effort and sacrifice.

One of my big concerns at the moment is that we will grow weary of doing good because of the cost to our own lives. I am afraid that we will stop supporting the people in Ukraine because we are sick of paying high prices for gas and groceries. So, what are simple things we can all do to help? (Ed. note: see this Newsletter for many suggestions of things you can do, right here and around the world!)

We can create beauty from the ashes of death and destruction, and in the process, I think we will find our own beauty magnified." (*Christine Sine, GodSpaceLight.com*)

"FRIENDS MAKE A DIFFERENCE"

You know, every so often someone crosses your path and because of it your life is altered, sometimes in a small way, but sometimes the impact of knowing this person can make a huge difference. About 14 years ago, I lost my wallet at Kroger. Not only were my credit cards and money in it, but the wallet itself meant something very special to me. When I got home and found it missing, I called the manager of Kroger, who said they would call me if anyone turned it in, but not to count on it.

Thus, it was to my surprise when the very next morning he called to say he had my wallet. He did, indeed, and we were both surprised to see nothing was missing. Close to tears with relief, I thanked him and then said, "Do you, by any chance, know who turned it in?" He said that one of his employees, a Joseph Allen, had found it in the parking lot and brought it to the front desk. Reading my facial expression, he said, "Here, let me call him up to meet you."

Here came this young man, a big smile on his face, who accepted my thanks, but honestly, he didn't see that it was a big deal. I thought about him for days. To me, it was a huge deal that someone found a wallet crammed full of credit cards and dollar bills and never thought about taking any of it. I decided to write a column about Joe Allen, which I did, and one of the strongest friendships I have today is with Joe and his dear wife Shannon.

I have another story to tell you about a young man who works at The Sands, where we live on the island of Key Biscayne, Florida. His duties include the maintenance of the pool, and that pool is vital to my "get well" program. For an hour and a half each day I do exercises in the pool. I even run in the pool (about 1,600 steps), something I could never do on land. Although it is a heated pool, I often got very cold. As I was often the only person in the pool during the week, this young man noticed me and knew I was trying my best despite being cold. Not only did he make sure the water was spotlessly clean, but he always spoke to me. One day I told him how much I appreciated the beautiful, super-clean water to work in, that it made it much more pleasant for me. "But sometimes it's cold," I added.

That was the last time it was too cold. No matter what the air temperature was, the pool water was perfect. Once day I told him the story of how I could not, not too many years ago, stand or walk without two canes, and how my heart and lungs were being compromised by the severe bend of my spine. "So, this pool is helping to save my life, Alain, and you are part of the process."

I had read his first name, Alain, on his shirt pocket, and when I called him by name, a smile told me he was, indeed, taking care of me the best way he could by making the pool the best he could make it. He said he was genuinely happy to know he was making a difference in my life and that I really was aware of it. Such a simple thing: two people going the extra mile, he to give me the best place to work and get strong, and I by making sure he knew how much he meant to me.

I knew he was a fellow animal lover as well, because he helped me find Tiger, our condo cat, when it was time to feed him. Seeing this led us into many precious conversations. I saw that he had great respect and reverence for all life and that this belief was behind all the music he wrote. I told him how truly rare it is to find a young man who already knows who he is and what his passion is, and as I looked in his face, I could already see who he would become, just as long as he stayed committed to his beliefs. I told him never to forget that even the smallest kindnesses are important. Just as he had helped me in my pursuit of wellness, he could make a huge difference in many lives, not only through his music, but through his everyday life of giving to others. I think we both considered our relationship a blessing.

SHOWER MINISTRY ARTICLE IN THE CHAFFEE COUNTY TIMES OF MARCH 3



Since Feb. 4, the Congregational United Church of Christ has been offering a free Shower Ministry to anyone on Fridays from noon to 2 p.m.

This shower program was started by Betsy Neas, Helen Duncan and Donna Maloney, who knew that the Presbyterian and Methodist churches had been doing this in Salida for those without homes.

"I work at the Arkansas Valley Christian Mission and many of those clients are folks living without showers," Neas says. "One gentleman came in one day and said he needed a shower but he didn't have the money to get one. I asked him how much showers cost and basically he said for him to get clean it would cost him \$7."

As CUCC already has two unisex showers installed, the program was established to help with this sort of issue, and will continue as long as there are people who need it.

"We hope the word gets around soon. We want to help people like this," Neas says. "We can't solve their homelessness issues but we can help them feel human again by taking showers free."

About 12 people can be accommodated each Friday, and so far, a few have turned out for the free service.

The church provides soap, shampoo, conditioner, towels, washcloths and hairdryers, and some of these materials, as well as books, are given away. A hospitality room is available for those who must wait, where they may warm up and enjoy a cup of coffee.

CUCC pastor Rebecca Poos says she has been delighted to watch this vision of the Shower Ministry come to fruition, with the congregation embracing the idea of reaching out to the community in a tangible and heartwarming way.

"One of our core values is extravagant welcome, the belief that every person on earth is created in the image of God and beloved—just as they are," Poos says.

"When we heard that simply having a shower can make a person experiencing difficult times 'feel human again', we knew we wanted to extend that opportunity to everyone we could welcome in. In the United Church of Christ, we believe that 'No matter who you are or where you are on Life's Journey, you are welcome here!' Now, we're getting to live out that belief and extend extravagant welcome every week through the Shower Ministry. And that's just the start."



CUCC COUNCIL MINUTES—March 16, 2022

Welcome and Opening Prayer: 7:25 pm. Opening prayer by Moderator Betsy Neas.

Attendees: Moderator Betsy Neas, Vice Moderator Kay Allinger, Pastor Rebecca K. Poos, Ann Condra, Bob Stocker, Marge and Ron Ericksen, Kathy Roman, Helen Duncan, Donna Maloney, Mark Wolters, Debby Cason and Guests: Mike Orrill and Abigail Public Health Staff.

Presentation of Chaffee Community Clinic by Mike Orrill and Abigail:

Three documents were made available to attendees that describe the project in detail:

- Chaffee Community Clinic: A Pilot Project of Chaffee County Public Health
- Harm Reduction Basics
- The Question of Enabling

These documents will be made available to members of CUCC on 3/20 and thereafter.

Important points made during the discussion:

- Partnering is key. Mike's first choice for partnering is with churches, because one of the basic values of a congregation is making people feel safe where they are. The Methodist Church in Salida has agreed to be a partner and will host the program one day per week. Mike would like to partner with CUCC for one day per week in Buena Vista. Partnering for CUCC means the use of Rooms 6 and 7 for the Basic Medical portion of the project, while keeping the 22-foot long trailer parked outside for initial client contact and Harm Reduction portion of the project.
- Tuesday was suggested as our day of choice. The hours initially will be 10:00am to noon, a one hour break, then 1:00pm to 3:00pm. We can put up a screen somewhere in the corridor between the Fellowship Hall and Rooms 6 and 7 if CUCC members feel more comfortable doing so.
- There will be a minimum of two and up to four staff members available at all times and the staff will clean up all areas of use in CUCC after each clinic and take trash with them.
- We can help by spreading the word about the availability of this program and by having collection drives for socks, underwear, and granola bars for the participants.
- This project is intended to help people who fall in the following categories: those struggling with substance use and mental health disorders, the homeless, the uninsured and under-insured, the under-resourced, undocumented persons, the LGBTQ community, and others who suffer from societal stigma.
- Drug addiction is now a fact of life and is often caused by traumas such as human trafficking and also by physicians who over prescribe pain medications.
- The goal of this program is to make people feel safe and to get them headed in the right direction. The program administers basic Harm Reduction principles and Basic Medical services to participants and then connects them with established services in Chaffee County to further their care. There is a five times greater chance that clients will move on to obtain other types of available services if they come to the Harm Reduction program first.
- Recovered people often want to give back, and currently there are 21 peer coaches working with clients of this project.
- The project includes a Disposal/Return feature to safely dispose of needles and syringes. Clients are told that if needles are left around, the program will go away!
- Health Colorado is one of the funders of this project.
- The issue of community push-back was raised and Mike said there was no community push-back in either Alamosa or Del Norte.
- It is the Council's goal to keep CUCC members informed, but the idea to partner with the Chaffee Community Clinic came from the Stewardship/Visioning Committee and ultimately this is a Council decision. A list of Council members will be made available to our congregation so their views can be made known. Council members will vote after church on March 27.

Other Business:

Review of COVID restrictions: After discussion, Mark Wolters made the motion that the June 2020 COVID restrictions be officially revoked. Helen Duncan seconded the motion which passed unanimously. This means that:

- It is up to each individual attending CUCC whether or not they wear a mask.
- Congregants need not sign in when attending church services.
- More chairs will be put back into the sanctuary.
- Fellowship Hour will resume. There will be a sign-up sheet for hosts, but we can keep the process simple, such as the host providing donuts and bagels from City Market if that is their choice. A donation basket will be provided. If no one signs up to host on a particular Sunday, coffee can still be provided to encourage fellowship after the service.

Clerk's Report: Debby reported that Membership is unchanged, but we had a new couple from Howard attend church service on 3/13.

Treasurer's Report: Helen distributed a very concise Financial Overview of General Fund contributions for March showing that \$9,738.61 was contributed in March. So far this year we are averaging \$2,923.70 per week and to meet our budget, we need \$3,130.00 per week.

Clean-Up Day: Mark reported that Clean-Up Day will be held the fourth weekend in April, and because of our small congregation, we will clean the narthex, the sanctuary, and the front office only. Mark will review the custodian job description as to whether cobwebs, etc., are covered.

Book Removal: There are many books from the Bazaar in a CUCC room that is needed for use by an outside group on April 7. A store in Leadville has agreed to take the books, but we need to help Kathy Roman move them. Also, some of these books can be sold at our next Annual Bazaar.

Music Camp at CUCC in June, led by Coletrain Music Academy: This group will need all rooms from the Fellowship Hall through the education wing. It will last for three to four days, during which one catered meal will be served. After discussion, it was decided to charge the group \$500 for the use of our facilities.

Pastoral Care: Rebecca reported that Ron Hassell's recent PET scan shows that almost all of his cancer is gone!

Closing prayer was offered by Debby Cason.

Adjournment: Meeting was adjourned at 9:08pm.

Next Council meeting will be held at 7:00pm on April 20.
