MODERATOR'S MOMENT

Resurrection takes many forms. In the Bible there is a very moving and heart wrenching story of a good friend of Jesus, Lazarus, who was ill, died, and brought back to life by the healing power of Jesus. (John 11:1-44) I believe our church has a Lazarus Resurrection Story to tell also. Our church was ill like Lazarus. It was sick from disputes and the pandemic and we have all been praying for wellness for our church. Now it appears that with the enduring love of God through the teachings of Jesus, the church is healing in ways never expected.

A year ago, we adopted a new Mission Statement: "As followers of Jesus, we are committed to exploring together Jesus' teachings, his action, and his justice, to better love, respect, and welcome all people." This statement gives the church and Rebecca clear and focused new direction. We implemented it through educational groups, outreach projects, and extravagant welcome. Now, at each Council meeting we ask the different Teams to report how they are responding to the Mission Statement. As a result, our church is teaming with community activities daily. We extravagantly welcome, as we always have, many community groups, plus we have two new ministries that help underserved folks.

In February, we started the Shower Ministry to help those without homes find a place to wash up and feel more human. All of a sudden there was excitement about a project we could really relate to, because we could help people in our community. Towels started coming in by the arms-full. The Facilities Team got right on it, setting the water temperatures for showers and making sure we had warm places to offer people on a cold wintry day. The Outreach Team started setting up volunteer informational meetings on how to show our guests extravagant welcome.

Then another ministry was sent our way through Chaffee County Public Health. Would our church be willing to host a mobile health unit called the Chaffee Community Clinic? This would entail parking a mobile clinic in our parking lot one day a week and using a few rooms in the Sunday School wing for procedures that couldn't be done in the trailer. This clinic would be set up to support those who might fall through the cracks of the confusing medical system, to get the help and direction they need. Of course, Council accepted Public Health's offer!

There is another new program provided by the County to help seniors find the resources they need. Molly Bishoff was hired by the County and leads a game day every Wednesday afternoon from 1:00pm to 3:30pm in the Fellowship Hall. There are card and board games available, along with drinks and snacks. During that time Molly is available to help anyone find resources for their needs.

Other things that happen in our church building that lift up the community are exercise groups, dance groups, Boy Scout activities, children's drama groups, educational opportunities, etc. We have become a real community center for both individuals and organizations, providing space for their activities. Did you know that the church only asks for a donation for use of our facilities? If you think of any other ways our church can be of service to the community, please tell someone on Council.

Now the church has become a very exciting, busy place. It truly feels like a Lazarus Story. Bishop Michael Curry stated in his book *Love is the Way* that the reason for the church is for the community. This is all a result of God's love and direction.

It is 10:30pm, Good Friday night, and I want to tell you - I have been to church! Gene, Seri Jean (our granddaughter) and I just got home from Broadway Baptist Church where we listened, prayed, worshipped, sang our hearts out, and ended the wondrous night sharing a meal with everyone.

One of my dearest, sweetest friends in Winchester is Christine Gay, and it was through her personal invitation to attend her church on Good Friday, a good 15 years ago, that brings us back every year. She is the one who tirelessly puts this whole thing together, asking singing groups from other churches, pianists, and a saxophone player to perform. It is a big job, and she never fails to present a spectacular evening of music, message, and good food. And she knows Gene and I will always be right there, God willing.

Now its bedtime and I am tired. We're home, I've fed the cats, changed into PJ's, and I sit in our big high bed, my soul too stirred to sleep. All the music keeps playing in my head and that *smile* keeps cropping up across my face.

Easter is a time of hope, of renewal, a time of miracles. It is my favorite holiday. As Pastor Peoples said tonight (though I can't quote him) - In a time of such violence, nation against nation, person against person, we need more than ever to renew our faith, remember Jesus' promises, and to live in the assurance that God loves us and takes care of us. Have a blessed Easter, my friends.



FACILITIES TEAM NEWS



CUCC COUNCIL MINUTES—April 20, 2022

Welcome and Opening Prayer: 7:07 pm. Opening prayer by Moderator Betsy Neas.

Attendees: Moderator Betsy Neas, Vice Moderator Kay Allinger, Bill Waldorf, Ron and Marge Erickson, Pastor Rebecca K. Poos, Helen Duncan, Linda and Ron Rak, Debby Cason, All attendees read the CUCC Mission Statement together: As followers of Jesus, we are committed to exploring together Jesus' teachings, his actions and his justice, to better love, respect and welcome all people.

Outreach Team report from Helen Duncan:

- Very generous contributions of close to \$2,000 were contributed to OGHS, most of which will go to Ukraine.

The shower ministry needs volunteers. We currently have seven regular volunteers, all of whom have been trained except for Herb Daugherty, who will be trained this coming Friday. New volunteers can call Betsy, Ellen Kely, Helen Duncan, or the church office to volunteer. Also, a sign-up sheet will be placed on the table in the back of the sanctuary for June, July and August volunteers. This ministry is in need of volunteers for the last Friday in April. Clients: So far there is one woman, plus several men from the Christian Mission, who are taking advantage of our shower ministry, but hopefully we will have more people during the summer. The financing is good. There is \$2,700 in the shower ministry budget.

Worship Team report from Linda Rak:

- Team members will be head ushers on Sundays, but anyone may sign up to be a greeter.

Facilities Team report from Ron Rak:

The team has been very busy completing the following projects:

- Repair of parsonage garage door
- Ramp built for Wilma Williams
- More chairs placed in the sanctuary
- Books removed from the art room

Going forward the team is:

- Gathering information on trimming cottonwood trees
- Gathering information on French doors
- Repairing blinds in the sanctuary
- Investigating the use of energy efficient lighting
- Creating an access portal to the water shut off valve for the sprinkler system located in the crawl space
- Clean-up day has been set for 9:00am to noon on Saturday, April 23. Volunteers will work in the narthex, sanctuary, and front hallway dusting, vacuuming, cleaning windows, and cleaning the sanctuary chairs.

Suggestions for future projects:

Financial Secretary's report from Helen Duncan & Kay Allinger:

The distributed monthly General Fund Financial Overview prepared by Kay shows:

Total giving from January through April 20 = \$44,490.13.

Total expenses for the same period = \$30,289.06.

To reach our budget we need \$3,130.00 per week.

The average weekly giving per week as of April 20 has been \$2,780.63.

Helen pointed out that she is not an administrator of Power Church. Kay is the only administrator; however, there is a back-up procedure: should anything happen to Kay, the Finance Chair or Treasurer is authorized to call Power Church and set up a new Administrator with a new password.

Comprehensive workshop on understanding financial reports given by Bill Waldorf.

- During his presentation, Bill pointed out that most churches do NOT include physical assets on their balance sheets because such assets are needed to fulfill the church mission and selling said physical assets is not contemplated.
- Rebecca reiterated the need for the Finance Team to scrutinize the list of Temporarily Restricted Funds to ascertain which are still needed.
- Helen pointed out that OGHS was not on the list of Temporarily Restricted Funds.
- Rebecca reiterated the need for the Team chairs to have income and expense reports on a regular basis in order for them to stay within their budgets, preferably once per month, but at the very least once per quarter. In this regard, three suggestions were made:
- 1. Receipts or invoices for monies spent could each be signed off by the Team chair; 2. each Team could have their own treasurer; 3. Kay volunteered to produce a monthly income and expense report for each team which would give the Team chairs the information they need.
- Rebecca suggested that the Finance Team meet to discuss financial controls and an internal process for approvals of expenditures.

Pastor's Report from Rebecca K. Poos:

- Outside users of CUCC facilities is going very well. Compliments on the sound system were received from leaders of the Coletrain music workshop and concert held last week. Users are cleaning up after themselves. We are receiving more requests for funerals and we will be hosting one on May 14. Nancy Best and Rebecca are working together to help families plan services.
- The Lenten program was deeply appreciated by Grace Church members. Rebecca is working with Bonnie Young for future
- Nan Bohe is hanging in there and loves receiving texts and cards from CUCC and communion and visits from family and Pastor.

CUCC SPECIAL COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES—March 27, 2022

Meeting was called to order at approximately 11:30am.

Attendees: Moderator Betsy Neas, Vice Moderator Kay Allinger, Pastor Rebecca K. Poos, Helen Duncan, Bob Stocker, Ellen Kely, Mark Wolters, Ron and Judy Hassell, Marge and Ron Erickson, Ron and Linda Rak, Debby Cason.

Purpose of Special Meeting: To vote on a proposal for CUCC to partner with Chaffee Community Clinic.

Preliminary Remarks: Packets containing information about this proposal were handed out to members of the congregation on Sunday, March 20. Bob Stocker asked whether any council members present today had received any feedback on the proposal and none was received.

Motion: Debby made a motion that CUCC agree to partner with the Chaffee Community Clinic in accordance with the guidelines prepared by Mike Orrill and the 3/16/22 CUCC Council Minutes. Mark Wolters seconded the motion.

Discussion: It was agreed that at least one CUCC volunteer be present for the first two sessions to offer an extravagant welcome and to again show the clinic staff how to operate our lock, how to reset the thermostat, the location of the toilets, and how to lock up the building when finished using it. Mark Wolters, Marge Erickson, and Ron Rak agreed to volunteer. It was further agreed that a divider be placed in the hallway between the Fellowship Hall and the back door.

Vote: The vote was unanimously in favor of this partnership.

Other Business:
